Bringing It Home: Teams Design Local Culture Classroom and Community Projects

Applications were due April 1, 2013. Selected teams will be announced soon.

This opportunity use immersive tours in Madison neighborhoods and innovative teaching tools during a four-day event August 12 – 15, 2013, WTLC will train four four-member teams composed of K-12 educators and community leaders in project-based learning strategies for investigating local culture. Teams will receive strategic assistance, mentoring and on-site coaching during the year as they create and implement a student-powered local culture project.

Youth Net is open 5 days a week throughout the year with a focus on academic success, healthy active living, and personal and social development. Annually, Youth Net serves over 350 Marshfield-area children and youth ages 8–18, with a daily attendance average of 155. Over 70% of these students qualify for free-and-reduced lunch, and 43% receive special education services. Children are referred to the program due to poor school performance, behavioral issues, and family conflict."
